Plans for the 2021 season were made, despite the on-going uncertainty of the covid-19 pandemic. The pent-up need for a safe, outdoor activity was recognised and as you can see in this brochure, it turned out to be an extraordinary year:

PAVILION REFURBISHMENT

The Big Decision

As 2021 dawned with another covid-19 lockdown and the tenders for the refurbishment of the pavilions came in at more than expected, the future of our project looked very uncertain. Should we press ahead or delay?

Work already completed

The extension to the irrigation system had been completed and the newly laid croquet courts had made good progress in the autumn. Plans had been drawn up, following consultations with the members, and listed building consent obtained for the pavilion refurbishment.

Funding

We had raised a substantial part of the funding, largely through the generosity of our own members and a successful Crowd-Funding campaign, but we were still short. Grant opportunities were starting to re-appear and some applications had been submitted.

Bullet bitten—no going back!

Work commences on 18th January. The enforced closure of the club because of lockdown means demolition and building can progress unhindered.


Let play commence

INTRODUCING CROQUET

- Two Open Days.
- Taster sessions for small groups on demand.
- Learn to Play courses run on Sunday mornings, Thursday evenings and Tuesday evenings. Eight-week course with a mix of GC and AC.
- Croquet Experience weekends run in May and August teaching skills via a 'gymkhana' and a mix of GC and Ricochet.
- Follow-on courses for newer members.
- Full programme of coaching from refresher courses for last year's beginners all the way up to elite level. 14 lead coaches (all qualified volunteers)
- Alternate stroke Hi-Lo doubles every two weeks, so newer and established members get to know each other.
- 'Pay and Play' introduced for people who don't have much spare time.
- After-school club for juniors every Wednesday.
- Corporate and social bookings.

Approximately 14% of Nottingham's population is from a minority ethnic background but this has not been reflected in the past in either the membership or the users of the club.

Efforts to address this began in 2019 with the launch of our 'Croquet for All' initiative. This year targeted advertising, social media posts, a welcome sign in different languages, along with our Community Engagement and schools programmes seem to have been well received.

Building on this will be an important strategy going forward.


